New this year, the *Race to Submit* will continue to track the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid / California Dream Act Application** submissions through the end of the school year (June 30th). Schools will continue working with any high school senior that has not yet completed their 2023-24 financial aid application as required by California Education Code Section 51225.7.



It is not too late to apply for financial aid. Students who plan to attend a California community college have until September 2nd to apply. Behavior Support: Behavior Specific Praise

Behavior Specific Praise is an intentional statement that follows an expected behavior. A Behavior Specific Praise statement is effective when it includes three components. The three components are: gaining your child's attention, describing the specific behavior that was observed, and delivering a positive and sincere statement acknowledging the result of the behavior. An example is, "Ximena, you shared your toys with your little brother and used gentle hands. I'm so proud of you for being such a kind big sister." By using Behavior Specific Praise, you increase the likelihood that your child will engage in the expected behavior in the future. Last Word, First Word Game!

The purpose of the Last Word, First Word activity is to learn the importance of exercising active listening for effective communication. Improvisational games allow us to learn how to take small risks and experience a little failure, in a safe environment, which helps to establish bonds through sharing a laugh. As learners, it's important to know how to listen to understand for effective communication.
