#### MESSAGE FROM THE DIVISION OF SPECIAL EDUCATION

We are happy to report that the Division of Special Education provided a virtual winter session to students with disabilities in grades 2<sup>nd</sup> through 8th. The session was eight days long during the winter break. The focus was on learning the use of virtual tools such as Snap and Read, and Co:Writer. Students took daily virtual field trips and engaged in virtual activities with their peers. We had approximately 700 students participate. Parent surveys noted the program was a success! Advancing Children's Educational Success (ACES) – Leichman Career & Transition Center.

The ACES program is a collaborative effort of the LAUSD Occupational Therapy & Physical Therapy and various Related Services programs including Language and Speech program to support students with disabilities in functional and academic skills, and to participate in daily meaningful school and life activities.

In collaboration with the classroom teachers at Leichman CTC, school occupational therapist Allison Gurvitz, speech therapist Stefani Haddox, and speech therapy assistant Saina Aldrich are providing additional fun opportunities for all interns to build their functional sensory motor, social and communication skills by participating in seasonal arts and crafts projects. A range of adapted strategies, including visual supports and checklists, adapted devices (i.e., loop scissors, label makers), and communication tools are available to support meaningful engagement and independence. #### Halloween Trick or Treat bags


