No One Starts Out Awesome: Advice for New Teachers

There is no single strategy for success. But positivity, flexibility, a desire to keep improving, and empathy will help along the way.

As we begin to explore what the post pandemic world looks like, I think about the challenges teachers have faced this year and the obstacles that may be ahead. My mind returns to 2007, when I began my teaching career.

While this brief reflection is hardly comprehensive, here are some of the points I wish I could go back and make to myself. I share them with you not as a recipe for all success but as starting points for a rich journey of growth.

Seek Positive Voices

If you are anything like me, you are entering the teaching profession because of a desire to help others. It is perhaps cliché, but the phrase "make the world a better place" comes to mind. This desire to help comes at an important time.

When my undergraduate and graduate students ask me about the single point I wish I had known when I started, it is this: Seek positive voices in your life and mentors who work from a positive stance.

Are there negative voices in the world of education? Such perspectives can be found in any path in life, but rather than focus on a deficit framework, I recommend seeking out voices in professional relationships that are also interested in helping others—those who see the beauty in the mess, and those who are willing to take time to work with new teachers.

Focusing on the moments of success can help us negotiate and better understand moments when we still have room to grow. Save the positive letters you get from students and families. Remember the moments of beauty from the day. Listen to those who see possibilities in students, and explore energized collaboration.

Making the Most of the First Month

The Classroom Environment: Creating an Environment of Respect and Rapport

Teaching depends, fundamentally, on the quality of relationships among individuals. Creating safe and supportive learning environments and helping students develop consistent, positive relationships with peers and adults are powerful ways to promote resilience and safety, improving



students' ability to engage and learn. In a highly effective classroom, teacher's relationships with students reflect learning, caring, and cultural understanding for individual students. Students trust the teacher with seneitive information and have a mutial respect and open dialogue in a variety of contexts. Students demonstrate self management and self-efficacy to achieve social emotional wellness (LAUSD TLF 2a1).

Your Connections Matter - Only when students feel calm, safe and connected to adults, can they be ready to learn

Here are 7 things to consider when creating relational safety with students:

- 1. Proximity Recognize that physical distance can impact how comfortable students feel.
- 2. Eye contact Be mindful of how eye contact can impact feelings of safety.
- 3. Tone of voice Use a gentle tone of voice to nurture more safety and calm.
- 4. Interest Express interest in students' family, life, hobbies.
- 5. Language Use comforting words such as "I believe in you, I support you."
- 6. Compliments Give authentic compliments to help students see themselves in a positive light.
- 7. Strengths Acknowledge strengths to empower them.
