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Local District Northwest Launches Apprentice Training To Expand Career Options for Graduates

An apprenticeship-preparation program that students can count as a "G" elective to meet L.A. Unified's "A-G" graduation requirements will be offered this fall at nine high schools as the District expands career pathways for students. "A-G" is a sequence of 15 courses required for admission to California's public universities. District students must pass "A-G" in order to get their diploma.

Sixteen teachers are undergoing training this week for the Multi-Craft Core Curriculum (MC3), which is an interdisciplinary program that integrates academic knowledge and technical skills. Hosted by Local District Northwest, the hands-on technical sessions are being taught by professionals with the Los Angeles Orange Counties Building and Construction Trades Council.

WHAT: Teachers are being trained and certified in the MC3 program, which allows

students to fulfill their college-preparatory course requirements while pursuing a technical career apprenticeship. The teachers are from Canoga Park, Chatsworth, Cleveland, Hamilton, John F. Kennedy, Monroe, Reseda, and Westchester High schools and the Sherman Oaks Center for Enriched

Studies.
