



Slide Slide View **Presenter's Text Say:** Now, we'll create groups of 5. Let's line-up First Turn, Last Turn Protocol according to our date of birth (January on the left, 1. In turn, share one annotated item, but do February after that and so on...). We'll number off not comment on it. by 5s and create groups accordingly. 2. Group members comment in round-robin order about the item. **Note-** Allow participants to settle into new groups. 3. The initiating person shares his/her thoughts last. **Say:** We'll use a protocol called "First Turn, Last turn" to hear from each other. In your group, Repeat pattern in sequence identify the person whose first letter of the first around the table. name comes first in the alphabet. That person will First Turn, Last Turn 7 begin the process of sharing his/her annotated item. Please note that we'll follow the sequence outlined on the slide, meaning that the person who first shares the annotated item will withhold his/her comments until everyone else shares their thoughts. In the counter-clockwise order, everyone else in the group will comment on the annotated item. The initiating person will share his/her thoughts at last. Note- Allow 15 minutes for this activity. **Say:** Going back to the article we read, the key **Developing Teacher Skills and Spreading** component of successful parent engagement is the Word quality professional development for teachers. There are 5 strategies that are highlighted in the article and we'll look at three of them. The professional development sessions that promote knowledge of (click) how to introduce academic lodel field-tested 8 standards in parent-friendly language, (click) how to share pertinent student data, (click) and how to model field-tested activities for facilities to practice at home were highlighted as successful strategies. Say: Which of the 3 practices are present at our school? **Say:** The first item from the previous slide is about Introduce Academic Standards sharing academic standards.
