DROPOUTS: A NATIONAL CRISIS

- Every school day, nearly 7,000 students become dropouts.¹
- More than one million students a year drop out of school.²
- Each year, approximately 1.3 million students fail to graduate from high school; more than half are students of color.³

EFFECTS ON THE STUDENT

- In California, a high school dropout earns \$9,367 less a year, than a high school graduate.⁴
- Over the course of a lifetime, a high school dropout earns on average \$260,000 less than a high school graduate.³
- High School dropouts are far more likely to spend their lives periodically unemployed, on government assistance or cycling in and out of the prison system.⁴



- Research consistently finds that high absenteeism--one specific indicator of engagement--is associated with higher dropout rates.⁵
- New research suggests that as many as 7.5 million students miss a month of school each year, raising the likelihood that they will fail academically and eventually drop out of high school.⁶
- Every year, 1 in 10 kindergarten and 1st grade students miss a month of school (excused and unexcused absences).⁷
- "Kindergarten absences can affect academic achievement, especially for low--income students unable to make up for lost time and can set a pattern of poor attendance and academic failure, fueling the dropout rate."⁷
