

The Successful Transition to **E**ducation and **E**mployment Program (STE<sup>2</sup>P) is designed for students who have the academic ability to succeed in college, yet face significant limitations in their social communication and organizational skills. Students can apply to STE<sup>2</sup>P in their junior year of high school or in fall of their senior year. In STE<sup>2</sup>P, students will learn the skills necessary to enter postsecondary education and prepare for a competitive workforce through development of social communication, executive functioning, selfadvocacy, and soft skills for the workplace.

# About the Program

STE<sup>2</sup>P provides a bridge from high school services to postsecondary adult life for students in need of additional transition support.
STE<sup>2</sup>P provides:

- -A Social Communication elective
- -College elective on academic skills needed to thrive in college, including familiarization with college support services available
- -Opportunity to take college classes with assistance accessing collegelevel accommodations
- -Travel training to independence
- -Study skills
- -Work Based Learning

### **EXPECTED OUTCOMES**

- Learn to be independent
- How to access & utilize college campus resources
- Access and navigate public transportation
- Increase self-advocacy skills
- Instill time management and organizational skills
- Develop soft skills for the workplace
- Develop social emotional learning in self-awareness, self-management, socialawareness and social management



### For Whom:

Students with disabilities who are working towards a diploma in general education curriculum classes and need additional transition support in the areas of social and independent living skills.

### Where:

Programs will be starting on the Pierce College and Mission College campuses in the 2018-19 school year.

### Qualifications:

- 11<sup>th</sup> grade or first semester 12<sup>th</sup> grade LAUSD student with an IEP
- Need for additional social skills, transition skills and other support to move from high school to postsecondary life as identified in the IEP process
- Ability/willingness to take public transportation to program site and work sites
- Ability to earn a general education diploma and will have completed four years of high school prior to enrollment
- Interest in post secondary education and/or employment
- IEP team recommendation that student would benefit from a modified schedule that allows for a 5<sup>th</sup> year of high school
